DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to declare their independence, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

Resolved, therefore, that these United States are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and that Kingdom is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as to the future, their political course should be directed to peace, commerce, and mutual friendship with every other Power, with whom they may be so connected.

And for the support of this Declaration, we the Representatives of the thirteen united States of America, in Congress assembled, do hereby publish and declare, that these Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and that Kingdom is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as to the future, their political course should be directed to peace, commerce, and mutual friendship with every other Power, with whom they may be so connected.

In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our hands and seals, this fourth day of July, 1776.
